
a letter from the farm manager

hydroponics


Hydroponics has remained booked and busy as the spring and summer months roll in!

We had the opportunity to showcase our lettuce and growing process at both the Wellness Fair in April and Community Day in May, both on campus. Those who stopped by our tables were shown how we grow our delicious produce and how we provide it for the community!

As the interest in hydroponics grows, we are helping to tailor what we grow to what we hear from our clients. Hearth and Harrow loves to use some of our produce, so we are experimenting with new crops to incorporate in their menu.

sustainability spotlight

Ever have a couple imperfect leaves on the bottom of your lettuce near the base?

Hydroponics is no stranger to this occurrence and although some may complain, our chickens don't! Instead of throwing these leaves in the garbage, we give them to our chickens and they get to enjoy a tasty snack.

animal spotlight

The alpacas that we have here at Pleasant View are Suri alpacas. Suri alpacas are known for their long pencil-like locks of wool that help to keep them nice and warm in the winter time. We have six alpacas here on the farm, including four females, and two males.

question column

Q: How long does it take to grow a head of lettuce from start to finish?

A: It takes approximately 55 days for the lettuce to grow from seed to harvest!

Q: Are the eggs from the farm better for us than store-bought?

A: Our hens have access to fresh air, a balanced diet, and plenty of grass to eat.

This helps to promote more omega-3 fatty acids, vitamin A, and vitamin E in the eggs, making them better for you! The eggs are also only a couple days old whenever you receive them, offering better flavor and texture!


quarterly stats
